This is the Town Manager's Report for December 2015. Department specific monthly reports are attached.

General

• We have an executed grant agreement to install a 2 vehicle EV charging station at Dan & Whit's.

Projects

- Alternate Projects for use of the pool repair funds.
 - Requests for Bids were prepared and issued for the following projects. Bids are due on January 6, 2016.
 - Clean up of the pool dam site
 - Addition to the Public Works Garage
 - Replacement of a culvert on Route 132 near Bowen Road
- Safe Routes to School
 - Starting the process to obtain the necessary easements from abutters of the project.
- Facilities
 - In response to the request for clarification of proposals received responses from four firms. The responses will be available for review by the Selectboard in January.
 - Budget estimates for improvements to the Public Works facilities were received from two design-build firms based on the RFI. Requests for bids for a modified project which just included an addition to the current building were requested.

Assessor

• The State has determined that Norwich's 2015 Equalized Education Property Value is \$732,739,000, the Coefficient of Dispersion (COD) is 7.75%, and the Common Level of Appraisal (CLA) is 95.35%. Because of the 2016 reappraisal, this CLA is not the figure that will be used in the final 2016 tax rate calculations.

Finance Department

• Delinquent taxes at the end of November were \$105,009. This compares to \$74,418 at the same time last year and \$166,711 in 2013.

Fire Department and Emergency Management

• The Fire Department responded to nine more calls in 2015 than in 2014. This is a four percent increase but there were many more significant incidents. The dry spring had area fire departments responding to multiple large brush fires. The largest was 135 acres in the Tigertown area of Norwich. The cold winter contributed to a large number of building fires where there was considerable damage.

Planning and Zoning

- Planning Commission had a meeting to discuss the potential impact of Act 250 Criteria 9L, which deals with settlement patterns, on future development in the Route 5 South & River Road Study areas. Joined by a representative from regional planning commission, a land use attorney and the planning consultant for the Route 5 South & River Road Study.
- Reviewed plans for a VTC cheese processing and research facility in an existing building at Norwich Farms. It qualified for an agricultural exemption.

Police Department

- Two of the 102 calls for service were outside of the officer's normal work schedule.
- The Police Department participated in the Governors Highway Safety Program Click It or Ticket 2015 Holiday Campaign. The campaign was to focus on impaired driving as well as distracted driving. During the campaign officers initiated 32 motor vehicle stops and issued 8 tickets.

Public Works Department

• The following table shows winter maintenance activities. Winter activities this year are much lower than last year at the same time because of the higher than normal temperatures.

- Delinquent Tax Collections through December were \$ 3,176. making delinquent taxes due at the end of December \$ 105,009. Penalty collected was \$ 254 and interest \$ 1,766 for delinquent and current year taxes. Last year at this time delinquent taxes due were \$74,418 and December, 2013 \$166,711.
- Current year tax payments made during December were \$ 214,649 leaving \$6,912,197 still to be collected.
- Review of the outside audit continued.
- Reconciliation for the processing of 2015 W-2's & 1099's has begun.

Fire and FAST Department

The Fire Department responded to nine more calls in 2015 than in 2014. While the numbers only show, a four percent increase there were many more significant incidents. The dry spring had area fire departments responding to multiple large brush fires. The largest was 135 acres in the Tigertown area of Norwich. The cold winter contributed to a large number of building fires where there was considerable damage.

Members participated in "winterizing" the apparatus and equipment. Pumps were drained and heat pans put on the trucks to reduce the chance of freeze-ups. We are updating our records management system by adding existing equipment and equipment maintenance records.

Training

FAST squad members attended training sessions on the new Vermont Protocols, CPR, AED and spinal immobilization. The new protocols permit EMTs to provide a higher level of advanced life support. This training was very "timely" as the FAST squad responded to two cardiac arrest calls. Fire training was "hands on"; members practice modern

Neil;

As you requested, here are some of the monthly stats of the Police Department from the month of December 2015.

Norwich Officers responded to 102 incidents during the month of December, and of those calls two (2) were outside the officers work schedule meaning officers responded twice (2) to calls during off duty hours.

The Norwich Police participated in the Governors Highway Safety Program **Click It Or Ticket 2015 Holiday Campaign**. The campaign was to focus on impaired driving as well as distracted driving. During the campaign officers initiated 32 motor vehicle stops and issued 8 tickets.

Norwich officers completed mandatory annual Firearms qualifications. The qualifications not only focus on shooting but also use of force, officer safety, public safety and "Shoot Don't Shoot" scenarios.

The Norwich Police Department would like to remind drivers to use extreme caution when driving in winter conditions. During the month of December officers investigated 12 motor vehicle crashes which is twice the monthly average of crashes investigated. Driving during severe winter storms is discouraged and motorists are advised to wait until conditions improve before venturing out.

I have been out of work and pretty much house bound since mid December for a medical procedure on my right knee. I have recently started physical therapy and hope to be back in the office soon.

Norwich Police would like to remind residents that the Norwich Winter Parking regulations are in effect and being enforced. There is no overnight parking allowed on the streets of Norwich during the winter months.

Winter Maintenance:

From the daily log:

- Dec. 1-Tues: After lunch, because of freezing rain, we checked all of the gravel roads, sanding as necessary.
- Dec. 2-Wed: Because of freezing rain continuing, everyone rechecked their sand route, applying sand as necessary. Everyone checked them again after lunch because of early release from school.
- Dec. 29-Tues: Because of snow overnight, I called everyone in (except Craig Kinney) at 3:30 pm. Everyone plowed their designated routes 3 times. After that, everyone treated the paved roads. Mike T. did the sidewalks. Everyone finished at 8:00 pm.
- Dec. 30-Wed: Everyone was in at various times today for storm cleanup. Mike T. came in at 1:00 am. Sonny came in at 3:00 am. Everyone else came in at 4:00 am. Mike T. and Sonny scraped the shoulders on the paved roads. After that, at 9:00, mike went onto the shoulders. Sonny went on to do his and Bob's sand routes. All of the gravel roads were sanded. Because of lingering snow showers, we put a light coat of salt on the pavement. Everyone finished at noon.
- Dec. 31-Thurs: Because of freezing rain overnight, I called everyone in at 4:00 am, except Mike T. and Craig Kinney. They came in at the regular time and worked at Town Hall all day. Everyone checked and sanded all of the gravel roads as necessary. After that, everyone cleaned their trucks and equipment.

Grant Projects:

We are currently out to bid for the repairs to Bridge 42. We were awarded a VT AOT Structures Grant for \$175,000 for this project.

FEMA Alternate Projects:

We are currently out to bid for the replacement of a dilapidated box culvert on Route 132 and for the restoration of the Norwich Pool Dam Area.

Personnel:

- Ben Trussell was out on short-term medical leave for 3 weeks.
- Bob Barden is currently out on medical leave following surgery on October 26th.

Transfer Station:

- In November, the recycling rate was 55% of all materials collected at our Transfer Station.
- 12-16-15: Good Point Recycling picked up 4,500 lbs. of electronic waste for recycling.

Pending Projects:

• We will complete our paving program projects for fiscal year 2015-2016 during the spring of 2016.
