Warrant for Annual Meeting of the Dresden School District Hanover, New Hampshire • Norwich, Vermont

Note: The following warrant articles apply to the operation of the Dresden School District, which includes the operation of the Frances C. Richmond School and Hanover High School, grades 7-12, and sixth grade students from Hanover who are tuitioned to the Frances C. Richmond School by the Hanover School District.

The legal voters of the Norwich (Vermont) Town School District and the legal voters of the Hanover (New Hampshire) School District are hereby notified and warned that the two phases of the Annual School District Meeting will be held as follows:

Discussion Phase: Thursday, March 1, 2012, at 7:00 P.M., at the Hanover High School

Auditorium, Hanover, New Hampshire.

Voting Phase: Tuesday, March 6, 2012, from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. in the Hanover

High School Gymnasium in Hanover, New Hampshire (for Hanover voters) and in Tracy Hall in Norwich, Vermont (for Norwich voters).

During the discussion phase, the voters shall have the opportunity to discuss the following Warrant Articles and to transact any non-substantive business that may legally be acted on during the discussion phase under Article 6.

All voting on Warrant Articles 1 through 5 shall be conducted by secret written ballot during the voting phase, as provided in the Dresden School District Procedures for Australian Ballot.

- **Article 1:** To elect by written ballot for one-year terms a Moderator, a Clerk, a Treasurer; an auditor for a three-year term, an auditor for a two-year term, and an auditor for a one-year term.
- **Article 2:** Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year?
- Article 3: Shall the District determine and fix the salaries of School District officers as follows: School Board members \$700 per member; School District Treasurer \$2,338; School District Clerk \$200; and School District Moderator \$200 in accordance with Article V-A of the NH/VT Interstate School Compact, and further raise and appropriate the amount of Eleven Thousand One Hundred Thirty-Eight Dollars (\$11,138) to fund these salaries?
- Article 4: Shall the District vote to approve the cost items in the three (3) year collective bargaining agreement reached between the Dresden School Board and the Hanover Education Association, NEA-NH, which calls for the following increases in teacher salaries and benefits:

This sum does not include the sums appropriated in any of the other articles.

2012 Dresden District Warning Article Descriptions

Article 1: To elect by written ballot for one-year terms a Moderator, a Clerk, a Treasurer; and three auditors for three-, two- and one-year terms respectively.

The positions noted above are voted upon annually. Information on each position is available in the Superintendent's Office.

Article 2: Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year?

A contingency fund can be used to cover unanticipated expenses in any part of the budget. If the funds are not used in a given year, they are not allowed to accumulate. Instead they are used to lessen the next year's tax burden. The contingency fund was not used in the 2011-12 fiscal year.

Article 3: Shall the District determine and fix the salaries of School District officers as follows: School Board members \$700 per member; School District Treasurer \$2,338; School District Clerk \$200; and School District Moderator \$200 in accordance with Article V-A of the NH/VT Interstate School Compact, and further raise and appropriate the amount of Eleven Thousand One Hundred Thirty-Eight Dollars (\$11,138) to fund these salaries?

The Treasurer's salary is a 3% increase; the other salaries are unchanged.

Article 4: Shall the District vote to approve the cost items in the three (3) year collective bargaining agreement reached between the Dresden School Board and the Hanover Education Association, NEA-NH, which calls for the following increases in teacher salaries and benefits:

and further, shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ninety-Eight Thousand, Three Hundred Dollars (\$198,300), such sum representing the estimated increase in teacher salaries and benefits for the 2012-2013 fiscal year brought about by this collective bargaining agreement?

Note 1: The sum necessary to pay the so-called status quo salaries and benefits for teachers if this article is defeated is included in the operating budget in Article 5.

Note 2: A favorable vote on this article shall be considered the approval of the cost items in all three years of the proposed collective bargaining agreement.

The Board and the Dresden and Hanover Education Association (the teachers' union) reached a three-year agreement for 2012-13, 2013-14 and 2014-15. This article raises the funds needed to implement this new agreement, which provides for base pay raises of 2.62%, 2.0% and 2.35% in the three years respectively, plus annual "step increases" for staff with up to 14 years of service. The agreement calls for funds to match employees' retirement savings up to 3% of a teacher's salary, down from 4% in the previous contract.

The District will also provide annual staff-development funds of \$115,000 (vs. \$125,000 in the previous contract) and staff-enrichment funds of \$25,000 (down from \$50,000 previously). One sabbatical leave will be offered in the 2014-15 year.

Article 5: Shall the District raise and appropriate the amount of Twenty-Three Million, One Hundred Eighty-Three Thousand, Five Hundred Sixty-Six Dollars (\$23,183,566) for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the teachers and other school employees, school District officials, and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District for the 2012-2013 fiscal year? This sum does not include the sums appropriated in any of the other articles.

This article indicates the cost independent of the costs associated with Article 2 through 4.

Article 6: To transact any non-substantive business that may legally come before the discussion phase of this meeting.



Minutes of the Dresden School District Annual Meeting Hanover High School Auditorium February 24 and March 1, 2011

Thomas Csatari called the meeting to order at 7:01 pm on Thursday, February 24, 2011. Present were School Board members Linda Addante, Kari Asmus, Carey Callaghan, Anne Day, Robin Carpenter, John Chamberlin, Kevin Cotter, Erika Finlayson, Neil Odell, Gordon Spaeth, Geoffrey Vitt and Steve Woods; Administrators Wayne Gersen, John Aubin, Joanne Roberts, Deborah Gillespie, Jim Nourse, Jonathan Brush and Mike Jackson; School District Attorney Cathryn Nunlist; Council representative Abidjan Walker; and approximately 27 members of the public.

Moderator Csatari then recognized Dresden School Board Chair Kari Asmus, who introduced the members of the Dresden School Board. Superintendent Wayne Gersen introduced the members of Administration and Legal Counsel.

Mr. Csatari reviewed the structure of the Dresden School District and District meeting process, explaining that this is the discussion phase of the meeting, and that the voting phase will take place Tuesday, March 1, from 7:00 am until 7:00 pm in Tracy Hall in Norwich for Norwich voters, and Hanover High School Gymnasium in Hanover for Hanover voters.

After Mr. Csatari reviewed the guidelines for the meeting, he read the Warning and noted that the Warrant was duly posted in both New Hampshire and Vermont.

ARTICLE 1: To elect by written ballot for one-year terms a Moderator, a Clerk, a Treasurer; an auditor for a three-year term, and an auditor for a two-year term.

Moderator Csatari read the positions up for election and the names of the candidates running for these seats. He noted that no one is running for the auditor positions. No public comment was offered.

ARTICLE 2: Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year?

Gordon Spaeth presented the rationale for this article. He noted that the contingency fund was not used this year, but the Board feels it is prudent to have the fund available. No public comment was offered.

ARTICLE 3: Shall the District determine and fix the salaries of School District officers as follows: School Board members \$700 per member; School District Treasurer \$2,270; School District Clerk \$200; and School District Moderator \$200 in accordance with Article V-A of the NH/VT Interstate School Compact, and further raise and appropriate the amount of Eleven Thousand, Seventy Dollars (\$11,070) to fund these salaries?

Geoffrey Vitt presented this article. No public comment was offered.

ARTICLE 4: Shall the District approve the cost items in the two (2) year collective bargaining agreement reached between the Dresden School Board and the Hanover Support Staff, NEA-NH, which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits:

and further, shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand, Six Hundred Dollars (\$16,600), such sum representing the estimated increase in support staff employee salaries and benefits for the 2011-2012 fiscal year brought about by this collective bargaining agreement?

NOTE 1. The sum necessary to pay the so-called status-quo salaries and benefits for support

staff employees if this article is defeated is included in the operating budget in Article 5.

NOTE 2. A favorable vote on this article shall be considered the approval of the cost items in both years of the proposed collective bargaining agreement.

NOTE 3. Pursuant to RSA 273-A:12, if approved, the terms of this collective bargaining agreement, including the pay plan, but excluding the cost of living increases, will continue in force and effect until a new agreement is executed.

John Chamberlin presented this article. He noted that there is no base increase in salaries in the year 2011-12; step increases will cost \$16,600. Raises in 2012-2013 will be based on the cost of living. Another aspect of the agreement is that educational assistants who substitute will see an increase in their pay for substituting, but this pay is not as expensive as paying for regular substitutes. No public comment was offered.

ARTICLE 5: Shall the District raise and appropriate the amount of Twenty-Two Million, Four Hundred Seventy-Three Thousand, Fifty-Four Dollars (\$22,473,054) for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the teachers and other school employees, school district officials, and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District for the 2011-2012 fiscal year? This sum does not include the sums appropriated in any of the other articles.

Steve Woods presented this article. He noted that this budget is a .5% increase over last year's expenditures. After explaining how net assessment is calculated, he pointed out that the net assessment is up 5.5%. This is due to less revenue, caused by a decrease in sixth-grade tuition, and the lack of leftover construction funds (which added \$500,000 to 2010-11 revenues). The net assessment is divided between Hanover and Norwich, based on the number of students each town sends to Dresden schools. Because of lower enrollments from Norwich, Hanover's share will be going up a little over 6%. In Hanover, the tax rate will increase 3%. Enrollment at the two schools is about the same as in the 2010-11 year.

The SAU budget is decreasing \$27,000. The Richmond Middle School's budget will decrease \$500,000. The lion's share of this decrease is from the graduation of several Special Education students. There will be a 13.39 FTE decrease in RMS staff, mostly from a decrease in Special Ed staffing. The Hanover High School budget is up \$654,648, \$290,838 of which is for Special Education. Another large increase is in payroll tax and benefits, due to increased staffing for the Special Education students. Still, there is a net loss of 3 FTEs in Dresden.

Two new initiatives to raise revenue this year are an increase in the athletic fees, which go into the general fund; and the high school's registration as a SEVIS school so that it can enroll international students, which will bring in additional tuition.

Woods noted the quality of the schools: The Richmond Middle School was recognized as a Spotlight School – one of 39 top schools in New England. Hanover High School was recognized as a Silver Medal School by U.S. News and World Report. Ninety-two percent of Hanover High School students take the SAT, and each set of scores is 100 above state and national averages. The same percentage of students goes to college.

In the fall of 2010, the Dresden Cost Reduction Committee was charged with evaluating whether there were cuts that could be made. The Committee found there was no low-hanging fruit; the administration had done a good job at tightening the budget. Woods also reported that the number of students in Special Education is less than average.

Eleven members of the public offered comments, and were about evenly divided on support of the budget.

Bill Garrity, chair of the Dresden Finance Committee, reported that the Committee voted to support the budget. The Finance Committee originally recommended that

the net assessment be no more than 2%. The majority felt that the Board did well in negotiations with the teachers' union; the minority felt that the Board could have incorporated more recommendations of the Dresden Cost Reduction Committee. Keith Moran, a member of the Dresden Finance Committee, one of the dissenting votes on the Finance Committee, expressed concern that the Committee voted to support the budget even though it did not meet its initial guideline.

ARTICLE 6: To transact any non-substantive business that may legally come before the discussion phase of this meeting.

Moderator Csatari asked if there was any other business to come before the meeting. Dresden Chair Kari Asmus came forward to thank those who are reaching milestones. She thanked Superintendent Wayne Gersen, who is retiring on June 30; John Aubin, Assistant Superintendent for Business, who has completed 10 years with the SAU; Bill Garrity, who is resigning from the Dresden Finance Committee; Tom Csatari, retiring as moderator; and Geoffrey Vitt, who is resigning from the Board.

There being no other business, Moderator Csatari thanked everyone and declared the meeting adjourned at 8:37 pm.

Dresden School Board Annual Report

This year Dresden welcomed Dr. Frank Bass as the new Superintendent. He wasted no time before joining administrators and staff in the important work of building on our foundation of exceptional educational programs. Whether reaching out to Dartmouth or discussing technology integration, his energy and enthusiasm are always in evidence.

Major initiatives are also taking place at the building level. At Hanover High School, faculty members are engaged in a school reaccreditation process through NEASC, the New England Association of Schools and Colleges. This process, which occurs once every ten years, requires that teachers and community members study all aspects of school operations as a means of identifying strengths as well as areas in need of improvement.

Teachers at the Richmond Middle School have used their staff development days learning how to incorporate principles of Understanding by Design (UbD) into their lesson plans. UbD is a framework for improving student learning of the curriculum by emphasizing effective activities as well as meaningful assessments of student comprehension.

Likewise, our Dresden Board dedicated significant time to school issues, from the HHS Code of Conduct and more equitably funding athletic teams to negotiations and developing an appropriate budget for the 2012-13 school year. As stated elsewhere, the Board adopted a District-wide total expenditure budget of \$23,443,004 (including a proposed teacher settlement), an increase of \$892,280 or 3.96% from the current year.

After several years of austerity in response to the poor economic climate and falling revenues, the Board felt that it could no longer delay basic investments in our technology program. The main budget warrant article (Article 5) includes sufficient funds to hire a Technician for each school, staff development in the area of technology integration, infrastructure upgrades, and the purchase of 25 iPads for each of the 7th and 8th grades. These investments account for approximately \$172,500 (or .76%) of the total increase.

The Board also strongly endorses the settlement with the Hanover Education Association (HEA) representing teachers and other certified staff members. After a year without a contract and receiving no raises, the new agreement would provide for annual base salary increases of 2.62%, 2.00% and 2.35% plus steps for each of the next three years. At the same time, the District match to 403(b) accounts would decrease from 4% to 3%. The Board believes the agreement shows significant cooperation on behalf of the HEA and encourages all District voters to give this separate warrant article (Article 4) their most serious and positive consideration.

In closing, I thank the many individuals who have supported our schools this past year. I would also like to offer best wishes and appreciation to our retiring Hanover High School Principal, Deborah Gillespie, for her 15 years of service to our students and our community—first as Dean of Students and then as Captain of our Marauder ship. Her innumerable contributions to our District will long be remembered.

Frances C. Richmond School Principal's Report

The school said goodbye to four staff members in June. Janet Rae (art), Paula Dorr (photography and cultural arts), and Carol Keighley retired after a combined 68 years of service to the district, and Julie Porrazzo (Mathematics) left to teach at another school. We miss their expertise and commitment to our students. We welcomed six new staff members: Luke Eastman and Sarah Glass teach a variety of art classes; Chad Behre teaches math and computer literacy; John Mitchell teaches math; Jennifer Ankner-Edelstein teaches French; and Carmen Bascunan teaches Spanish.

Our students continue to excel in many state and national arenas. In mathematics, RMS has placed first or second in the state MathCounts competition four years in a row. Forty students, grades 6-8, participated in RMS Robotics. Four teams, advised by a teacher and coached by parent volunteers, competed in the "Body Forward" Challenge at the Dartmouth Invitational Tourney in November 2010, where they earned top awards for research and robot design as well as first and second place for the Champions Award. Three of the four teams advanced to the NH State Championship and finished in the top half of the competition. In the National French Contest, 17 students placed 11th or higher in the state competition, and 52 8th graders placed in the top 10 at the state and/or national levels. The school continues to perform well on the New England Common Assessments, with 80% of the students scoring in the proficient or above categories on all tests for all grade levels.

Our commitment to the fine and performing arts continues to enrich the school and local community. Play Production class put on "Childhood Stories from Tots to Teens," an original play composed of a variety of scenes and songs about events and issues in children's lives. The spring plays, "Marmalade Atkins in Space" and "Kindness" – were one-act plays: a British farce, and a reality-based middle school situation, both dealing with middle school concerns and conflicts through humor, imagination and inventiveness! In addition, "The Lorax," an original adaption of the Dr. Seuss book by a class of 7th and 8th graders, was presented to the 6th and 7th grades to call attention to our present environmental crisis. Last May more than 20 Richmond Middle school students were accepted to perform in the Northern District Music Festival at Merrimack Valley Middle School. Four dozen of our photography students had their work accepted in the local Elden Murray Exhibition and Competition and six won juried prizes.

Community outreach plays an important role in shaping our school program as well. Two highly successful fundraisers sponsored by the Student Council were completed, with 2,000 canned food items collected for The Upper Valley Haven in October and a benefit dinner in the winter to raise funds for a pediatric hospital in Japan after the earthquake and massive flooding. Our service group, Children Helping Children, raised almost \$18,000. After the devastating earthquake and tsunami hit coastal Japan in March, members of our community with relatives in Kessenuma asked for our help, and we were able to join fundraising forces with the Ray School and others to send almost \$13,000 to support children in the schools and the pediatric unit at the local hospital. We also sent funds for the construction of a teen and women's center in Tanzania, helped an orphanage in Honduras, and were thrilled to see pictures of the completed small library in Kokech, Kenya, which we had funded over two years.

Our close relationship with Kendal of Hanover continued as students hosted teas, honed writing skills and made friends via a structured correspondence with residents of Kendal in biweekly journal exchanges, learned to write memoirs with Kendal residents in their English classes, collaborated with residents to write books of poetry that culminated in a joint RMS/Kendal poetry reading, and performed musical, dramatic and Quiz Bowl performances at Kendal.

A new initiative is our sustainability program, which dovetails with the towns' efforts to reduce their carbon footprints and to increase public awareness of local and global environmental issues. Several committed students and staff researched a school-wide composting program that was launched in the fall of 2011.

We welcome all parents, guardians and community members to come see us in action — it is truly a vibrant learning community!

In 2010-2011, approximately 13% of the 749 students who attended Hanover High School were public or private tuition students. In 2010-2011, U.S. News and World Report again selected Hanover High School as one of the top high schools in the nation.

Hanover High School is an active learning community that provides broad academic and cocurricular programs. Approximately 97% of our 2011 graduates are attending or plan to attend college. During the 2010-2011 school year, Hanover High School had 14 National Merit Scholar Finalists and four students received National Merit Scholarships.

Recommendations on the Proposed Dresden 2012-2013 School Budget and the Proposed 2012-2015 Dresden Teacher Contract

The Dresden Finance Committee (DFC) voted 7 to 1 to support the Dresden School Budget of \$23,443,004 which represents a 3.96% increase over the current year.

Due to sound fiscal management by the SAU, the new budget, exclusive of the new teacher contract and new technology initiatives, increased 2% over the current year. To that base budget, the School Board added a new technology program that a majority of DFC members are ambivalent about. The School Board also agreed to a new teacher contract that a majority of the DFC members do not support. These additional expenditures caused the overall budget increase to 3.96% over the current year.

DFC members who voted not to support the proposed budget did so because the cost of the new teacher contract is in excess of what is necessary to attract and retain excellent teachers, because the School Board refused to vote up or down any of the recommendations of its Cost Reduction Committee in its 37 page report, "Averting a Crisis", and because greater consideration in the teacher contract negotiations should have been given to the economic reality as expressed by many Upper Valley employees experiencing job loss, wage cuts, and loss of benefits, and while employers like Dartmouth, DHMC, and other local businesses cut costs and conducted layoffs.

DFC members voted 5 to 3 to not support the proposed teacher contract for the reasons stated above, and because the contract did not meet our guidelines to the School Board for "level funding in total compensation". The new contract is estimated to have a three year cost of \$908,657. The DFC also asked that the "Dresden teacher premium" be reduced; however, in the first year of the last contract, Dresden was paying 32% over the New Hampshire teacher average, and now pays 36.6% over the NH average (according to the NH Department of Education). The new teacher contract, therefore, is set to increase the "Dresden premium" instead of reducing it.

The cost of step and track is as follows: it appears that the average salary increase in the proposed contract is 2.32% per year. However, a teacher in his/her first 14 years of employment also receives step 4.5% increases, thus a 6.82% annual raise. Each time the teacher earns 15 credits of post graduate education, he/she receives another 5% track raise giving the teacher an 11.82% annual raise. (There are seven tracks.)

The teachers were not asked to increase their 20% co-pay on the family policy provided, nor asked for any co-pay on their dental, disability, or life insurance provided. And thankfully the New Hampshire legislature adopted a new tenure policy effective July 1, 2011 raising the longevity for tenure from 3 years to 5 years.

The DFC members supporting the new teacher contract feel that the proposed contract represents a fair compromise with the teachers. Over the life of the proposed contract, salary increases would average 2.3% per year for the 65% of the teachers that no longer receive step increases. This increase is offset by a 1% reduction in employer retirement contributions for a net compensation increase of 1.3% per year for those teachers. They also recognize and appreciate the reductions in other areas including teacher sabbaticals, early retirement provisions, and professional development expenses. Additionally, they took under consideration that the teachers do not have a contract in place which resulted in no step or base salary increases for the FY12 academic year.

General Information

- Access from Highways: A written permit is required for any new or changed access from a property to a state or Town road. A permit is also required if the use of a private road is changed, e.g., logging road changed to a residential driveway. Permit applications are available from the Town Clerk or Zoning office and should be submitted to the Zoning Administrator.
- Zoning and Building Permits: No building construction or land development may commence, and no land or structure may be devoted to a new or changed use within the Town without a permit issued by the Zoning Administrator. Any business carried on within the home requires either a Home Occupation Permit or a conditional-use approval by the Development Review Board (DRB). All subdivisions require approval from the DRB.
- On-site Sewage Disposal Systems: New or replacement sewage disposal systems require a wastewater permit issued by the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation (802-885-8855). Construction, modification or expansion of any structure requiring a new or expanded sewage disposal system may not commence until a wastewater permit has been issued. Repairs or modifications to existing sewage disposal systems may also require a state permit.
- Solid Waste Disposal: Use of the Town Transfer Station and Recycling Center is limited to Norwich residents. A windshield sticker, which costs \$15, may be obtained at the Town Clerk's office. You pay a per-bag fee for all trash that cannot be recycled. Fees are \$3.50 per ticket purchased at the Transfer Station and \$30 for a card of 10 purchased at the Town Clerk's office or Transfer Station.
 - Permits for the landfill in Hartford, Vermont, are available at the Town Clerk's office, together with the rules and coupons necessary for payment. Coupons cost \$4.00 each, \$40.00 for a card of 10, and windshield stickers cost \$20.
- Pet Licenses: All dogs and wolf hybrids must be licensed annually on or before April 1 of each year. A current rabies vaccination certificate must be presented before an animal can be licensed. Regular license fees are \$8 for a neutered male or spayed female, \$12 for others. A statutory fine of one-half of the license fee will be charged for dogs licensed after April 1.

Copies of all ordinances are available or on file at the Town Clerk's office.
