Note: The following warrant articles apply to the operation of the Dresden School District, which includes the operation of the Frances C. Richmond School and Hanover High School, grades 7-12, and sixth grade students from Hanover who are tuitioned to the Frances C. Richmond School by the Hanover School District.

The legal voters of the Norwich (Vermont) Town School District and the legal voters of the Hanover (New Hampshire) School District are hereby notified and warned that the two phases of the Annual School District Meeting will be held as follows:

Discussion Phase:	Thursday, February 25, 2010, at 7:00 P.M., at the Hanover High School Auditorium, Hanover, New Hampshire.					
Voting Phase:	Tuesday, March 2, 2010, from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. in the Hanover High School Gymnasium in Hanover, New Hampshire (for Hanover voters) and in Tracy Hall in Norwich, Vermont (for Norwich voters).					

During the discussion phase, the voters shall have the opportunity to discuss the following Warrant Articles and to transact any non-substantive business that may legally be acted on during the discussion phase under Article 7.

All voting on Warrant Articles 1 through 6 shall be conducted by secret written ballot during the voting phase, as provided in the Dresden School District Procedures for Australian Ballot.

- Article 1: To elect by written ballot for one-year terms a Moderator, a Clerk, a Treasurer; and an auditor for a three-year term.
- Article 2: Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year?
- Article 3: Shall the District determine and fix the salaries of School District officers as follows: School Board members \$700 per member; School District Treasurer \$2,270; School District Clerk \$200; and School District Moderator \$200 in accordance with Article V-A of the NH/VT Interstate School Compact, and further raise and appropriate the amount of Eight Thousand, Nine Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$8,970) to fund these salaries?
- Article 4: Shall the District vote to approve the cost items in the three (3) year collective bargaining agreement reached between the Dresden School Board and the Dresden and Hanover Service Employees, AFSCME, which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits:

2010 Dresden District Warning Article Descriptions

Article 1: To elect by written ballot for one-year terms a Moderator, a Clerk, a Treasurer; and an auditor for a three-year term.

The first three positions noted above are voted upon annually while the auditors are elected to staggered three-year terms. The names of the candidates are listed at the end of the Dresden section of the annual report. Information on each position is available in the Superintendent's Office.

Article 2: Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year?

A contingency fund can be used to cover unanticipated expenses in any part of the budget. If the funds are not used in a given year, they are not allowed to accumulate. Instead they are used to lessen the next year's tax burden. For 2009-10 the funds were used to help reduce a deficit at the end of the fiscal year. Given our recent needs for these funds and the tight budget for 2010-11, the Board wants to continue including this fund in the operating budget.

Article 3: Shall the District determine and fix the salaries of 2010-11 School District officers as follows: School Board members \$700 per member; School District Treasurer \$2,270; School District Clerk \$200; and School District Moderator \$200 in accordance with Article V-A of the NH/VT Interstate School Compact, and further raise and appropriate the amount of Eight Thousand, Nine Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$8,970) to fund these salaries?

The salary for the school board members, clerk and moderator were held at their current levels, though some Board members opted to forgo salaries for 2010-11.

Article 4: Shall the District vote to approve the cost items in the three (3) year collective bargaining agreement reached between the Dresden School Board and the Dresden and Hanover Service Employees, AFSCME, which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits:

and further, shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Four Thousand, Five Hundred Eight Dollars (\$24,508), such sum representing the estimated increase in service employee salaries and benefits for the 2010-2011 fiscal year brought about by this collective bargaining agreement?

Note 1. The sum necessary to pay the so-called status quo salaries and benefits for service employees if this article is defeated is included in the operating budget in Article 5.

Note 2. A favorable vote on this article shall be considered the approval of the cost items in all three years of the proposed collective bargaining agreement.

Note 3. Pursuant to RSA 273-A:12, if approved, the terms of this collective bargaining agreement, including the pay plan, but excluding cost of living increases, will continue in force and effect until a new agreement is executed.

The Board and the Dresden and Hanover Service Employees reached agreement on a three-year agreement. This article provides the funds needed to implement this new agreement, which will advance service employees on their steps for 2010-2011 with no change to the pay scale for current employees. New hires will begin at a lower entry-level step and have an altogether lower pay schedule. For 2011-2012 and 2012-2013 the pay scale will increase by 1% to 2.5% based on the cost of living. For 2010-2011, employees' co-pays for health insurance are frozen at the dollar figure for 2009-2010. In future years the 15% co-pay will be reinstated. These funds and the agreement cover the service staff at the Richmond Middle School and Hanover High School.

Article 5: Shall the District raise and appropriate the amount of Twenty-Two Million, Six Hundred Seventy-Three Thousand, Four Hundred Eighty-Seven Dollars (\$22,673,487), for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the teachers and other school employees, school district officials, and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District for the 2010-2011 fiscal year? This sum does not include the sums appropriated in any of the other articles.

This article includes all costs independent of the costs associated with budget Articles 2 through 4 and Article 6. In total, this budget will seek a spending increase of \$727,599 over the 2009-10 Dresden budget warrant article. Additional budget information will be sent out in a separate mailing and will be available at www.sau70.org.

Article 6: Shall the Dresden School District raise and appropriate the amount of One Hundred Eighty-Three Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$183,500) for the support of students with disabilities, such amount to be fully offset through funds provided by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009?

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, a part of the stimulus package passed by Congress in 2009, allotted \$236,265 of supplementary funds for grades 7-12 Special Education for 2009-10 and 2010-11. Following a public hearing in August 2009, the district allocated \$52,765 of the available funds. This warrant article authorizes the Board to spend the balance of these funds, \$183,500, to support students with disabilities. Because these are federal funds that flow through the district, this appropriation has no impact on the tax rate.

Article 7: To transact any non-substantive business that may legally come before the discussion phase of this meeting.

Minutes of the Dresden School District Annual Meeting Hanover High School Auditorium February 26 and March 3, 2009

Moderator Thomas Csatari called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m. on Thursday, February 26, 2009. Present were School Board members Linda Addante, Kari Asmus, Carey Callaghan, Robin Carpenter, John Chamberlin, Kevin Cotter, Erika Finlayson, Jim Mackall, Mary Magavern Sachsse, Gordon Spaeth, Geoffrey Vitt and Steve Woods; Administrators Wayne Gersen, John Aubin, Joanne Roberts, Deborah Gillespie, Ron Eberhardt, Jim Nourse, Mike Lepene and Jonathan Brush; School District Attorney Cathryn Nunlist; and approximately 24 members of the public.

Moderator Csatari read the Warning and noted that the Warrant was duly posted in both states, New Hampshire and Vermont, and that the returns of service were duly notarized. He then recognized Dresden School Board Vice Chair Mary Sachsse, who introduced the members of the Dresden School Board. Superintendent Wayne Gersen introduced the members of Administration and Legal Counsel.

Moderator Csatari reviewed the structure of the Dresden School District and District meeting process, explaining that this is the discussion phase of the meeting, and the voting phase will take place on Tuesday, March 3, from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. in Tracy Hall in Norwich for Norwich voters and Hanover High School Gymnasium in Hanover for Hanover voters.

After Mr. Csatari reviewed the guidelines for the meeting, the business of the meeting followed.

ARTICLE 1: To elect by written ballot for one-year terms a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer; and three auditors (for one-, two- and three-year terms respectively).

Moderator Csatari read the positions up for election.

No public comment was offered.

ARTICLE 2: Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000 to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year?

Gordon Spaeth presented the rationale for this article.

No public comment was offered.

ARTICLE 3: Shall the District determine and fix the salaries of School District officers as follows: School Board members \$700 per member; School District Treasurer \$2,270; School District Clerk \$200; and School District Moderator \$200 in accordance with Article V-A of the NH/VT Interstate School Compact, and further raise and appropriate the amount of Eleven Thousand Seventy Dollars (\$11,070) to fund these salaries?

John Chamberlin reviewed this article.

No public comment was offered.

ARTICLE 4: Shall the District raise and appropriate the amount of Twenty-one Million, Nine Hundred Forty-Three Thousand, Seven Hundred Eighty-Eight Dollars (\$21,943,788), for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the teachers and other school employees, school district officials, and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District for the 2009-2010 fiscal year? This sum does not include the sums appropriated in any of the preceding articles.

Robin Carpenter presented this article.

Dick Podolec, Chair of the Dresden Finance Committee, reported that the Dresden Finance Committee voted 8-3 to support the budget. He summarized the committee's position, both in support of and against the budget. He reported that the committee

strongly urged the administration to present a more cost-effective budget for the 2010-11 school year.

Five members of the public asked clarifying questions and offered comments.

ARTICLE 5: To transact any non-substantive business that may legally come before the discussion phase of this meeting.

Moderator Csatari asked if there was any other business to come before the meeting. Hearing none, he thanked everyone and declared the meeting adjourned at 8:02 p.m.

Dresden School Board Annual Report

Every year as I read the Principals' Reports, I am struck by the energy and diverse talents that teachers and staff, students, and community members all bring to our schools. At the same time, I know that the activities and achievements listed in this report represent only a fraction of the initiatives undertaken or the work completed.

As a School Board, we have also followed with interest the development of a "Writing across the Curriculum Initiative" at the Richmond Middle School and the implementation of "Core Competencies" at Hanover High School to meet a new state mandate requiring students to demonstrate mastery of core academic skills. Likewise, we have been pleased to see progress in the use of technology to communicate with parents with the opening of the PowerSchool Portal at the high school and the introduction of a common report card at the middle school.

Further, School Board committee members and Administrators made many contributions as we pursued goals set out last spring. These efforts included negotiating with the service employees, providing the board with a comprehensive understanding of our athletic program, developing fundamental priorities based on information gathered at forums and through a questionnaire, and last but not least, by shepherding the budget through many stages as we move toward the Annual District Meeting.

Although every budget season has its challenges, this year was particularly difficult. In addition to a 4.7% enrollment increase at the high school and large increases in uncontrollable accounts such as medical insurance and retirement, we also have a backdrop of increasing financial pressure for many in our community.

In response to concerns raised by the public, board members pared the increase in expenditures to 2.3%, net of new offsetting revenues. This was accomplished through painstaking review of each line item by our Administrators and their staffs. As a board chair, I am grateful for the contributions made by each employee to this process, and in particular, I would like to note the Hanover Education Association's willingness to come forward.

Much is at stake this year, and I hope that all voters will take the time to review the information available in this report and on the Web at www.sau70.org. I would also encourage anyone who has questions to attend a discussion of the Dresden warrant on Thursday, February 25, at 7 p.m. in the Hanover High School Auditorium or to contact any board member. Voting will be held the following Tuesday, March 2, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Absentee ballots are available.

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Frances C. Richmond School Principal's Report

This year the Richmond Middle School (RMS) welcomed four new staff members. Kristen Downey teaches 7th grade English; Jen Haines teaches 7th grade English and serves as our academic support tutor; Laura Abbene is our media specialist; and Julie Porrazzo teaches 6th & 7th grade mathematics. In addition, Maryann Nugent, an educational assistant who is a certified teacher, is teaching a section of 6th grade Social Studies this year.

The school said goodbye to four staff members in June. Hope Miller (media specialist), Bruce Lorden (Social Studies), and Judy Pond (English), retired after a combined 68 years of service to the district, and Erica Wright (Mathematics) resigned to pursue other endeavors. We miss their expertise and commitment to our students.

The students continue to excel in many state and national arenas. In mathematics, two members of the RMS MathCounts team were on the four-person state team that represented New Hampshire at the national competition, and in the AMC8 International Math Contest, the school achieved the Distinguished Honor Roll, which is the highest ranking. In Robotics, one of our teams earned the Champions Award at the regional qualifiers. In French, our students continue to do well on the national *Le Grand Concours* competition – 21 8th graders and 10 7th graders finished in the top 10% in both New Hampshire and the nation. The school continues to perform well on the New England Common Assessments, with 80% of the students scoring in the proficient or above categories on all tests for all grade levels.

Our commitment to the fine and performing arts continues to enrich the school and local community. The school play was an excellent production of the classic, *Little Women*. The Play Production classes raised \$550 for the Selamta Children's Home in Ethiopia with two performances of their original theater piece, *Uncharted Territory: Dreams, Awake and Asleep*. Our Hemberger-White Exhibition Hall continued to offer viewers some wonderful artwork from local community artists, staff members, and students with its exhibition, "Animalia." The Trumbull Hall Troupe, a group of middle and high school students from several school districts, treated us to A *Fish Tale*, written by local author Jodi Picoult. This year we sent a number of RMS musicians to the Northern District Chorus & Band Festival. Four dozen of our photography students had their work accepted in the local Elden Murray Exhibition and Competition and six won juried prizes.

Community outreach plays an important role in shaping our school program as well. Our eighth graders served the community through a variety of activities each Wednesday during the second semester ranging from working at local day-care centers and nonprofits such as Listen and The Haven to raising money for international causes.

A new initiative is our sustainability program, which dovetails with the towns' efforts to reduce their carbon footprints and to increase public awareness of local and global environmental issues. Several committed students and staff joined the Vermont Carbon Rally competition and won first prize for middle schools, which came with a \$5,000 award to be applied to further our sustainability efforts.

We welcome all parents, guardians and community members to come see us in action – it is truly a vibrant learning community!

Dresden Finance Committee Report

Dresden School District Budget FY 2010-11

At the Dresden Finance Committee (DFC) meeting on January 27, 2010, the twelve members attending voted unanimously to support the proposed FY11 Dresden School District budget of \$22,732,457. The DFC noted that the budget effectively meets all the Budget Guidelines adopted by the Dresden School Board and supported by the DFC.

* Bottom Line Operating Budget: The \$727,599 increase in proposed expenditure budget includes \$228,638, which sum is wholly offset by income and reflects a change in accounting practice. Consequently, the actual net expenditure increase is 2.27%.

The Committee acknowledged that a higher-than-projected enrollment and significantly higher health insurance premium rates which materialized after the guidelines were adopted made it difficult for the Administration and the Dresden School Board to meet the guidelines.

The DFC believes that a budget that more than meets the guideline targets should be supported.

It supports the combined package of the other warrant monetary articles that comprise the budget.

The Committee recognizes the disparity of tax impact between Hanover and Norwich residents, and encourages Norwich to work with the state of Vermont to arrive at a more reasonable tax-sharing formula and process.

The Committee looks forward to working with the Dresden School Board and the Administration in the coming year to reduce costs while maintaining the quality of the Dresden school system and educational experience.

The DFC consists of seven representatives from Norwich (three elected, three appointed and the elected Town Treasurer) and seven members from Hanover (all appointed) including one Selectboard member and one School Board member.

General Information

- Access from Highways: A written permit is required for any access from a property to state-aid roads and all Town roads. If you wish to create a driveway or access to property from these roads, you must obtain a permit. A permit is also required if the use of a private road is changed, e.g., logging road changed to a residential driveway. Permit applications are available from the Norwich Town Clerk and should be submitted to the Norwich Zoning Administrator.
- Zoning and Building Permits: No building construction or land development may commence, and no land or structure may be devoted to a new or changed use within the Town without a permit issued by the Norwich Zoning Administrator. Any business carried on within the home requires either a Home Occupation Permit or a conditionaluse approval by the Development Review Board (DRB). All subdivisions require approval from the DRB.
- **On-site Sewage Disposal Systems:** New or replacement sewage disposal systems require a wastewater permit issued by the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation (802-885-8855). Construction, modification or expansion of any structure requiring a new or expanded sewage disposal system may not commence until a wastewater permit has been issued. Repairs or modifications to existing sewage disposal systems may also require a state permit.
- Solid Waste Disposal: Use of the Town Transfer Station and Recycling Center is limited to Norwich residents. A windshield sticker, which costs \$1, may be obtained at the Town Clerk's office. You pay a per-bag fee for all trash that cannot be recycled. Fees are \$3.50 per ticket purchased at the Transfer Station (by check only) and \$30 for a card of 10 purchased at the Town Clerk's office.

Permits for the landfill in Hartford, Vermont, are available at the Town Clerk's office, together with the rules and coupons necessary for payment. Coupons cost \$3.80 each, \$38.00 for a card of 10, and windshield stickers cost \$20.

Pet Licenses: All dogs and wolf hybrids must be licensed annually on or before April 1 of each year. A current rabies vaccination certificate must be presented before an animal can be licensed. Regular license fees are \$8 for a neutered male or spayed female, \$12 for others. A statutory fine of one-half of the license fee will be charged for dogs licensed after April 1.

Copies of all ordinances are available or on file at the Town Clerk's office.
